POLICE OFFICERS MEMORIAL DAY – Mayor Zieman has proclaimed May 14-20, 2017 as "POLICE OFFICER WEEK" in Saint Peter and May 15th as

OFFICER "POLICE MEMORIAL DAY". This special time is observance in the United States that pays tribute to the local. state. Federal peace officers who have died in the line of duty. The Memorial Day takes place on May 15th each year, and Police Week is the calendar week in which the Memorial Day occurs.



The holiday was created on October 1, 1961, when Congress asked the President to designate May 15th to honor peace officers. John F. Kennedy signed the bill into law on October 1, 1962. The Proclamation signed by President John F. Kennedy stated in part...."To pay tribute to the law enforcement officers who have made the ultimate sacrifice for our country and to voice our appreciation for all those who currently serve on the front lines of the battle against crime, the Congress, by a joint resolution approved October 1, 1962 (75)

Stat.676), has authorized and requested the President to designate May 15 of each year as "Peace Officers Memorial Day," and the week in which it falls as "National Police Week" and by Public Law 103-322 (36 U.S.C. 175) has requested that the flag be flown at half-staff on Peace Officers' Memorial Day."

President Obama honored Police Officers in 2013 by stating, in part... "The 143 fallen officers we honor today put themselves on the front lines of that fight, to preserve that quality of community, and to protect the roots of our greatness. They exemplified the very idea of citizenship -- that with our God-given rights come responsibilities and obligations to ourselves and to others. They embodied that idea. That's the way they died. That's how we must remember them. And that's how we must live. We can never repay our debt to these officers and their families, but we must do what we can, with all that we have, to live our lives in a way that pays tribute to their memory. That begins, but does not end, by gathering here -- with heavy hearts, to carve their names in stone, so that all will know them, and that their legacy will endure.

TZD EXTRA ENFORCEMENT WAVES: This summer the Saint Peter Police Department will continue to perform grant-funded traffic enforcement through the Towards Zero Death (TZD) program. The major focus of the Towards Zero Death program is to reduce traffic injuries and fatalities through the four E's: Education, Emergency and Medical Trauma, Enforcement and Engineering.

The enforcement tier of the Towards Zero Death enforcement includes participation of overtime shifts with the intent to change poor behavior

related to violations of seat belt, child seats, impaired driving,

TZD'S STATEWIDE GOAL: Fewer than 300 fatalities and 850 serious injuries on Minnesota's roads by 2020.

distracted driving, and speed.

Here are three of the upcoming enforcement waves:

- Seat Belt Wave May 22- June 4: This wave enforcement is emphasized towards seat belt and child seat belt violations. Look for additional enforcement and possibly a saturation with partnering agencies! No seat belt at 60 miles per hour is equal to a 12 story fall. Click it or Ticket!
- Speed Enforcement Wave July 7 July 23:
 The focus for this wave will be on speeders and aggressive drivers. In 2013-2015 in Minnesota, illegal or unsafe speed was a contributing factor in 188 fatal crashes resulting in 201 deaths.
- Impaired Driving Wave August 18 September 3: This wave will be concentrating on impaired drivers. Did you know that in 2015 there were 25,027 arrests for DWI? Plan ahead and have a sober driver.

The Officers of the Saint Peter Police Department thank you for doing your part and helping us strive towards our ultimate goal of zero deaths on our roadways.



BICYCLE SAFETY - Summer's almost here and that means an increased number of bicycles on the roads and sidewalks. For many of us who haven't been on a bike in a while, a few safety tips might be helpful.

Riding a bike can be fun, if you know how to stay safe. But if you don't follow the rules, it can be dangerous. To be safe on your bike, follow these tips:

- Always wear a helmet and fasten it. Helmets protect your head, and in many states it's illegal not to wear one!
- Wear bright clothing so drivers and other bikers can see you.
- If you want to ride after dark, ask an adult and remember to put reflectors on your clothes, helmet, and bike. Adults should wear the reflectors also!

- Obey the rules of the road. Bikers must stop at all stop signs and traffic lights and use turning signals, just like cars.
- Ride on the right hand side of the road, in the same direction as traffic.
- Look both ways. Most crashes happen at intersections or driveways so be on the lookout for people who may not see you.
- Ride on bike trails, roads with little traffic or in parks. If you do come to a busy road, walk your bike across intersections at a crosswalk.
- Keep your bike tuned up. You don't want to get a flat tire far away from your house!
- Protect your bike. Lock it up or keep it in a safe place when you're not using it. Don't leave your bike out in your yard because someone just might come along and ride away with it. Also, don't leave your bike in an open or unlocked garage.
- Ride with friends. It's more fun and you have someone to help you if you need it.

And don't forget to register your bike at the Police Department. The cost is only \$1.00 and it may help get your bike back if lost or stolen. The information from the bike is entered into a nation-wide database and if your bike is stolen and recovered somewhere else, the Saint Peter Police
